LOCAL PROGRAMS AND SERVICES AVAILABLE TO ASSIST HOMELESS STUDENTS

REQUIRED SCHOOL WEBSITE INFORMATION

84TH TEXAS LEGISLATURE - HB 1559 - TEC 33.906

SUMMARY of REQUIREMENTS:

- All schools that maintain a website must post information on their websites about local programs and services available to assist homeless students. This information may include charitable programs and services and organizations providing food, clothing, shelter, counseling, medical services, and other interventions for homeless students and families.
- These schools must make a good-faith effort to collect this information and post this information in a format easily understandable by the students or parents served by the school. District-wide resources may be listed. To the extent possible, the resources provided should be specific to each school and local community.
- A representative from a local service or program
 available to assist homeless students may request
 that their information be included on the school
 website. Each school may determine what will be
 posted and is not required to post information as
 requested by the representative.
- A school district is **not liable** for any harm to a student resulting from a connection with a local program or service referred to on the website as provided by this statute.
- The law does not apply to a school within a school district that has fewer than 3,000 students AND is primarily located in a county with a population less than 50,000.

COMPLYING with the LAW:

Schools must compile and post the resources and information in a format and style that is easily understandable by students or parents.

Questions for consideration:

- ➤ Is the information easy to find in a few clicks perhaps even linked on the homepage?
- ➤ Is the information presented in a language parents and students can understand?
- Would someone unfamiliar with school language (Title-I, Federal Programs, Student Services, etc.) be able to easily locate and understand this information?

The law requires that information about local programs and services are listed. **LEAs may also include information, such as:**

- District Homeless Liaison contact information
- Listing existing resources from local/regional homeless coalitions or United Way agencies
- Linking to local service provider agency websites
- Links to homeless education sites, such as the Texas Homeless Education Office (THEO) and Education Service Center Region 10.
- Information about parent involvement opportunities
- Information for unaccompanied homeless youth
- · School student success stories
